A number of journals have published reviews of *The Genesis of Flight*. Here are some quotes from the editor of Ballooning Magazine:

Opening this book for the first time I was immediately transported back in time to my childhood. For this is what it must be to live the adage "like a kid in a candy store." # LUNCHEON SPEAKER THE 2002 ANNUAL LUNCHEON WILL BE HELD ON THURSDAY, MAY 9

Colonel James A. Shaw, USAF (Ret.) is the President and Chief Executive Officer for the Association of Graduates of the United States Air Force Academy. As such, he leads an organization whose mission is to provide service to a graduate community of over 30,000; to support the needs of the Air Force Academy and its current and future cadets; and work to preserve the heritage and traditions of the Academy and the Air Force. Colonel Shaw entered The United States Air Force Academy in 1963, graduating with a Bachelor of Science Degree Engineering Science in 1967. He spent the next 26 years in operational, training and staff assignments including tours of duty as a combat controller, rescue pilot,



instructor, staff officer and aide de camp. He commanded the soaring and parachuting squadron at the Academy, and was responsible for counter narcotics planning for the North American Aerospace Defense Command. Colonel Shaw retired from active duty after serving as the Deputy Chief of Staff for Plans and Programs at the Air Force Academy. He then joined the Association of Graduates staff as the Vice President of Development where he was responsible for developing and implementing programs to support the growing needs of the association, the graduate community, the Academy and its cadets.

Colonel Shaw is a Command Pilot with over 3,000 hours of flying time, a Master Parachutist, and a Certified Air Traffic Controller. He attended Air Command and Staff College and was a research associate at Queens University in Kingston, Ontario, Canada. He also holds masters degrees from the University of Arizona and Auburn University.

Colonel Shaw's wife, Cindy, teaches first grade in a local school district. The Shaws have three daughters, Genie, Kali and Erin. Colonel Shaw and Cindy enjoy theater, music, most outdoor activities and sports. The family resides in Monument, Colorado.

#### SOUTHEAST ASIA POW EXHIBIT



As noted in the last Newsletter, The Friends sponsored an extensive exhibit of the documents, photographs and artifacts that depicted the American prisoner of war experience in Southeast Asia. The exhibit, which was on display from September through November in the Academy Library, was developed from a collection of artifacts donated to the Academy by Mr. Lee Humiston and the Southeast Asia Prisoner of War Archive that was obtained for the Academy Library by The Friends from the Office of the Secretary of Defense. The archive was gathered in support of the publication of the award-winning book, Honor Bound: American Prisoners of War in Southeast Asia, 1961-1973. The collection is the largest and most definitive of Brig. General its kind in the United States.

On 16 November, the exhibit was moved from the Academy Library and placed on display in Arnold Hall in conjunction with a ceremony for the unveiling of a statue honoring Brig. General Robinson Risner, USAF, (Ret.). General Risner was a prisoner of war in North Vietnam from 1965 to 1973. As a senior ranking officer in the "Hanoi Hilton," General Risner became an inspiration to all for his leadership and dedication to his country. Over 100 former prisoners of war who had served in North Vietnam attended the ceremony. Mr. H. Ross Perot donated the statue to the Academy and attended the ceremony, Mr. H. Ross Perot and General Risner reviewed the exhibit and each was presented with an edition of a copy of The Genesis of Flight by the Secretary of The Friends, Brig. General Philip Caine.



This rare 18th Century print depicts the first balloon ascension in Great Britain, Vincent Lonardi accomplished this feat over London in 1784. This superb print, published in Paris in 1790, was donated to The Friends of the Academy Library by Mr. Dean A. Phelps, one of the original members of the USAFA Class of 1960. The print constitutes a significant addition to the holdings in the Gimbel Collection of the Academy Library.

#### ANNUAL MEETING



The Board of Directors of The Friends gathered in Doolittle Hall at the Air Force Academy for its annual meeting on December 7, 2001. General Clark convened the meeting. New Board members, Colonel Jock Schwank, Dr. Don White and Colonel Jim Gaston, were introduced. Also introduced, but unable to be present, were Brig. General Erlind Royer and Dr. Richard Lemp. All of these individuals bring special talents to the Board and we are very happy to have them join us.

The first order of business was the election of officers and members of the Executive Committee. The incumbents were all unanimously elected. Those members of the Board whose term of office expired in 2001 were also unanimously elected to another three-year term. Our Treasurer, Brig. General George Fagan, then reported that we are solvent but needed to continue effective fund raising in order to pursue the projects we have under consideration.

The Board Meeting featured two special presentations of great importance to the future of the Friends. The first was by Colonel Jim Shaw, President and CEO of the Association of Graduates (AOG). Colonel Shaw talked about the AOG fund-raising campaign and how that effort will impact on The Friends. As reported in the last Newsletter, The Friends has asked for significant AOG support over the next few years in order for us to accomplish some of our long-term projects. Certainly, Colonel Shaw's talk reinforced our confidence in our partnership with the AOG in achieving our long-range objectives.

The second presentation was by Colonel Jim Gaston and Mr. Matt Gaston of Word One, Inc. They first explained how they want to proceed with the 50th Anniversary of the Academy DVD project and then showed a short example of what such a DVD might feature. They demonstrated the DVD that is to be a companion piece to The Friends book on Falconry at the Academy that is presently under consideration for publication. Both demonstrations were very impressive and certainly reassured us that our partnership with Word One has a bright future and the projects we have undertaken show great promise.

Our final report was by the Director of Academy Libraries, Dr. Ed Scott. Dr. Scott first thanked The Friends for our continued support and then briefed the Board on several challenges that face the Library, primarily in the area of personnel. Certainly Dr. Scott faces some daunting challenges in the weeks and months ahead and all the members of The Friends need to stand ready to support him and the Library in any way we can.

The last item of business was a unanimous vote to change the date of our annual Board Meeting to coincide with the date of the annual luncheon. This moves the Board Meeting from the dead of winter to spring and will facilitate easier attendance at both the Board Meeting and the luncheon by those members who live outside the Colorado Springs area.

#### 50th ANNIVERSARY

As reported in the last Newsletter, one of the major, long-range projects that The Friends has undertaken is producing a DVD of the first 50 years of the Air Force Academy along with an updated version of the "History of the Academy" display that was such a success in January 1998. The Friends had several meetings with key Academy officials in an effort to put this project on a firm foundation since it must be finished by April 2004. The most important meeting was in mid-January the Superintendent. Superintendent, Director of Plans, President/CEO of the Association of Graduates (AOG), and the Director of Development. As a result of that session. at which Mr. Matt Gaston of Word One, Inc., presented a superb example of our proposed DVD project, it was agreed that the project would be funded by the AOG with the full support of the Academy and the senior staff.

This meeting was followed in the next few days by meetings separately with the Director of Plans and the AOG at which details of the arrangement were worked out. As a result of this effort, Word One, Inc., has been tasked to begin the first phase of the DVD project. This entails video interviews with key people in the development and evolution of the Academy. Of significance, the first two interviews were with Lt. General A.P. Clark and Brig. General George Fagan, which were completed in February. The Executive Committee is excited about having this very significant project underway. Not only will it be a major part of the celebration of the 50th Anniversary, but it will also provide a living history of the Academy that will be critical in documenting the evolution of the institution.
